THE HISTORY OF OSA

Rising soybean demand in the 1950s and '60s led to the creation of OSA in 1966.

Organizers thought the group could be "beneficial with respect to political influence in determination of government programs and policies affecting soybeans," according to the minutes recorded at the first meeting. During the 1980s, OSA worked to create a state

soybean checkoff before the existence of the national Soybean Research and Promotion Checkoff, all while working to promote biodiesel and food-grade soybeans. Today, OSA works for soybean farmers across Ohio through legislation, advocacy and policy to ensure the success of the soybean industry for years to come.
